The past few years have been like no other. Of course, no one had ever experienced a pandemic the scope of COVID-19 so there was no way to predict the aftermath. The aspect of that whole experience that struck me is the resiliency of The Healing Place.

The heart of our model is one alcoholic or addict reaching back to help another. That gives us a significant level of flexibility and focus. That focus allowed us to continue to provide quality addiction recovery services, both residential and outpatient, to those who suffer from substance use disorder.

In the face of so many disruptions for staff – staffing adjustments, schedule changes, family stressors, diminished resources for clients, the stress of COVID in addition to the stress of recovery – our team was able to maintain their singular focus of helping those in need. For many, the process of addiction was not interrupted by the pandemic and was in fact exacerbated.

The Healing Place staff continue to step up to the challenges that they face every day. They are to be commended for their efforts. As we settle into our new normal, we will continue to focus on providing low-barrier services to those who are still suffering from alcohol and drug addiction.

This is why we now formally provide clinical assessments, treatment plans, individual therapy, and targeted case management. This is how we can offer more care to our clients.


By changing our informal processes into formal ones, we not only provide more services to those who need them, but we can also identify gaps and begin addressing them.

More than 1,500 people in Louisville are living on the streets - some by choice, others the victim of circumstance. In September 2021, The Healing Place began a partnership with Metro Louisville for a pilot program to provide case management and peer support services to the homeless in our community.

The Homeless Outreach Program began with 12 beds, which filled quickly. In April 2022, the number of beds available in this program doubled to 24.

In its first nine months, the Homeless Outreach Program served more than 80 people. Many of them now have homes of their own or have reconnected with loved ones.

Clients in the Homeless Outreach Program can spend up to one year at The Healing Place. They work with a case manager and peer support specialists to find a job, get healthcare, and navigate the housing process.



Some of those who have moved into permanent housing after leaving The Healing Place say they felt safe for the first time in a long time while in the Homeless Outreach Program.

Many of Louisville's homeless prefer to stay in homeless camps or on the streets and do not want to go to a shelter. Our Homeless Outreach Program team spends time in these camps each week, building relationships and handing out food, water, socks, and hygiene items.

## **RICHARD'S STORY**

Richard also suffers from multiple health issues and hadn't seen a doctor in seven years. He now has established relationships with a primary care physician, specialists, and is taking his medications.




## **MILLIE'S STORY**



# THE HEALING PLACE OF New Hanover County, NC





This 200-bed facility will provide detox services, a long-term residential recovery program, transitional care, and an overnight shelter for men and women.

The Healing Place of New Hanover County will bring more resources to Coastal Carolina to help Wilmington's most vulnerable populations. The program will use our nationally recognized social model of recovery to address the behavior that drives addiction, no matter the substance. We believe that recovery begins with the concept of one alcoholic or addict reaching back to help another.

The Healing Place of New Hanover County is the latest replication of The Healing Place model, which is used in 14 Recovery Kentucky sites across the Commonwealth as well as programs in Richmond, Virginia and Raleigh, North Carolina.

The Healing Place looks forward to being part of the solution in the Wilmington area for this community in need.









### BRIAN MINGIA Executive director The healing place of New Hanover County

I have worked in substance abuse and mental health for the past 14 years, both in direct care and in an administrative role. My mother passed away from substance use, which ultimately drives my motivation in working in this field. It is always my goal to treat everyone who enters our doors like a son, daughter, mother, or father.

The Healing Place of New Hanover County is a wonderful program that will be able to serve thousands of individuals across Eastern North Carolina to help them in their recovery journey. The Healing Place has the lowest barrier to treatment in the region and being part of that critical access point has always been my goal. This is also the only long-term program in Eastern North Carolina. The sense of community in a long-term program, where people are all trying to better themselves, is inspiring and I look forward to being part of this process with them.

The Healing Place is needed in Wilmington because we have seen an increase in substance abuse and homelessness for years. There are great recovery communities and resources for folks in this area, however The Healing Place is an additional resource I believe will help those currently underserved. A place that has minimal barriers and a long-term peer-led program will go a long way in caring for this community.

I am most excited to be part of this project from the beginning and developing a culture that is inclusive to those in need. The internal community is what drives the program and working with clients to create an environment people want to be a part of is the goal. The relationships and bonds that people make through the recovery process is lifelong and being here to support those connections is a big part of my job. People are going through a strenuous process, but what I have seen is a community that cares about one another and really believes in the ability to stay sober.

# **2021 FINANCIAL REPORT**

The 2021 audit was conducted by Strothman & Company PSC and produced a qualified opinion, noting an intercompany transaction that was not eliminated. 


